AFFORDABLE: UW System Institutions Most Affordable Options for Students

- Four years of frozen tuition has helped make college more affordable for students in the short-term, but now:
 - o Class sizes are increasing and class choices are decreasing which can mean more time to graduate
 - o Can harm the quality of students' experience
- The decision related to tuition costs should be kept at the Board of Regents: they are the closest to the students and need to be able to consider options for 2018 and beyond.

Note: UW Colleges are not included in the tables below because the UW Colleges do not have established peers; they are not technical colleges or community colleges. However, the cost of tuition for a student taking 15 credits of college parallel courses is lower at the UW Colleges than it is at Wisconsin Technical College System.

Financial Aid: Major Component of Affordability

• June 2016: <u>Board of Regents approved a proposal</u> to recommend increased grant funding for University of Wisconsin students in the 2017-19 biennial budget for the Wisconsin Higher Educational Aids Board (HEAB). HEAB's Board will determine the actual request.

- o 2017-18: \$6,384,100 increase
- o 2018-19: \$6,384,100 increase
- o Total biennium request: \$19,152,300
- This funding would be provided to HEAB the UW System does not receive these additional resources.
- State funding for the Wisconsin Grant Program has remained flat since 2010-11 at \$58.3 million





Flexibilities

- Flexibilities help the UW save students and taxpayer money. The state has worked to provide more flexibility over recent years, and additional procurement and revenue bonding flexibility will allow us to better compete with our peers.
- **Program Revenue Bonding**: UWSA would like to pursue new statutory language that authorizes the Board of Regents to issue revenue bonds for program revenue funded projects.
 - The Legislature would authorize a bond ceiling, and the State Building Commission would release the bonds in the amounts requested by the University.
 - DOA bonding staff would handle the issuance and sale of revenue bonds, while the university would manage the projects. This new process will be critical to successfully pacing our capital projects.
 - Note: the Department of Transportation currently uses this mode to secure bonding for state roads.
- **Procurement**: UWSA would like direct procurement authority from the legislature to purchase only specialized goods and services most critical to meeting higher education needs. In the past, this limited flexibility required DOA delegation to the UW System, and we would like this flexibility delegated directly to UW System.
